Due to the advent of the internet and the ubiquity of the smartphone, pornography is more accessible, affordable, anonymous, and available than ever before. According to a nationally representative survey of U.S. teens, 84.4% of 14 to 18-year-old males and 57% of 14 to 18-year-old females have viewed pornography.[1] Additionally, a 2020 study also found that the majority of 11-13 year olds have already been exposed to porn, with some being exposed as early as 7 years old.

While decades of studies from respected academic institutions have demonstrated significant impacts of porn consumption for individuals, relationships, and society, very few individuals, especially youth are aware of these impacts.

Fight the New Drug's Live age-appropriate presentations combine the most up-to-date research, personal stories, and engaging visuals to help educate students on the harmful effects of porn.

Each presentation helps students understand the impacts of pornography on individuals, relationships, and society and includes the following content.
